This Month in History

from the Vienna Newsletter archives

JANUARY 1998 - At its January 26 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on a proposed ordinance to provide a partial real estate tax exemption for the renovation, rehabilitation or replacement of certain residential and commercial structures. For single-family homes, the structure must be at least 25 years old, the improvement must increase the assessed value of the structure by at least 25%, and the improved structure may not exceed the total square footage of the footprint of the original structure by more than 30% and may not cause lot coverage to exceed 25%.

JANUARY 1988 - The Town's oil recycling program got off to a very successful start as 250 gallons of waste motor oil were collected during a four-hour period last month. The Public works Department has set aside the first Saturday morning every three months to accept oil from town residents.

JANUARY 1978 - Residents who are permanently and totally disabled and have low incomes are now eligible for relief from payment of Town auto tag fees. Application forms must be filed by January 31 to qualify for relief in 1978.

JANUARY 1978 - Public hearings on several important matters have been scheduled for the month of January, including the proposed widening of Park Street from Maple Avenue to the town limits.

Town's Bond Rating Upgraded to AA

The Town of Vienna has been notified by Standard & Poor's that its general obligation public improvement bond rating has been raised from "AA-" to "AA." This rating enables the Town to sell bonds at more favorable interest rates compared with those of municipalities not so highly rated, resulting in substantial savings for Vienna taxpayers over the life of the bonds.

The Standard & Poor's analysis noted, "The town's historically strong financial position has improved, aided by three straight years of operating surpluses. We expect management to maintain the town's strong financial position and effectively manage future capital needs and related debt issuance."

To protect its excellent credit rating, the Town Council has consistently adhered to a policy of keeping a low ratio of net debt to market value of taxable property, and a ratio of debt service to general fund disbursements below 10%.

The Town of Vienna borrows money by issuing tax-free general obligation bonds to finance major capital projects such as street improvements, development of new facilities, land acquisition, sidewalk construction, and water and sewer system improvements. Bond financing spreads the cost of these capital projects over a period of many years, rather than charging the full cost to today's taxpayers.

Special Pickups Resume in January

Vienna's Special Pickup program resumes this month. To dispose of furniture, building materials, brush and other debris not included in the regular trash collection, residents can order a Special Pickup. Place discards at the curbside, then call the Special Pickup recording at 703-255-5727 and be prepared to leave the following information: your name, address, daytime phone number, amount of debris, and type of debris.

Each residence is entitled to receive two free Special Pickups per year, with a limit of one dump truck load per pickup (about the size of a Volkswagon "beetle"). Additional pickups cost \$75 per load for all items except brush. The fee for additional loads of brush is \$25 each.

Special Pickups are for the sole use of the property where the debris has been generated and cannot be transferred to another property in the town. Place all items at the curb or edge of pavement in front of your property.

Special Pickup Guidelines

The amount and type of debris allowed are limited to the following:

- 1. Discarded furniture, swing sets and playground equipment.
- 2. Sod and brush.
- 3. 300 pounds of scrap metal per residence, small automobile parts such as engine blocks, transmissions and tires. All tires must be removed from the rim.
- 4. Trees and limbs of a diameter greater than 1½ inches and less than 6 inches, and no more than 8 feet in length.
- 5. Building materials (not generated by contractor), which include the following items: wood, broken concrete, bricks or block, fences, drywall, and paneling. Each residence is limited to 300 pounds (approximately two wheelbarrow loads) of masonry items such as concrete, brick, block, stone, rock, etc. per pickup.
- 6. Please refrain from placing piles of brush under power lines or trees, or close to shrubs, walls or vehicles. Place all piles in an open area accessible to a crane truck.
- 7. All sharp items such as box cutters, razors, saw blades and large panes of glass should be wrapped in several layers of newspaper.
- 8. In the interest of safety, parents should caution their children not to play in or around debris placed at the curb for a special pickup.

The following items will **not** be picked up:

- Gas tanks.
- 2. Fuel oil tanks.
- 3. Pressurized tanks such as propane, air or freon.
- 4. Mounted tires. (Town crews will pick up the tire and the rim as long as they are separated.)
- Tree stumps and tree parts over 6 inches in diameter. Large tree stumps or tree parts
 over 6 inches can be disposed of at the Fairfax County Transfer Station located on
 West Ox Road or at the Fairfax County Landfill located in Lorton.
- 6. Hazardous materials such as fuel, paints, solvents, insecticides, fluorescent light tubes, etc. can be disposed of through the Fairfax County Hazardous Waste Disposal Program. The drop-off center for hazardous waste is the I-66 Citizens' Recycling and Disposal Facility located at 4618 West Ox Rd. (just beyond the Fire & Rescue training academy). Call 703-324-5068 for further information.
- 7. Biohazardous waste including needles and syringes.
- 8. Contractor generated material.
- 9. Brush and trash that are mixed.
- 10. Dirt.
- 11. White goods, which include stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators, window air conditioners, whole house air conditioners, microwave ovens, large toaster ovens, hot water heaters, garbage disposals, washing machines, dryers, cook-tops, dehumidifiers and furnaces.

Call Promptly for Your Special Pickup

Please call the Special Pickup number, 703-255-5727, as soon as debris is placed at the curbside. Piles of trash that go uncollected for weeks on end because of residents' failure to call for a Special Pickup are an eyesore and a potential health and safety hazard.

It is illegal to place debris in the public right-of-way without arranging for a Special Pickup. When an illegal pile of trash is spotted by or reported to Town personnel, the resident will receive a notice to call for a Special Pickup within 48 hours. If no action is taken by the resident after the notice is issued, the Town will seek legal remedy to gain compliance with the Town Code.

No White Goods in Special Pickups

White goods are not collected as part of the Special Pickup program. White goods include stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators, window air conditioners, whole house air conditioners, microwave ovens, large toaster ovens, hot water heaters, garbage disposals, washing machines, dryers, cooktops, dehumidifiers and furnaces.

Many appliance dealers will remove an old unit when a new one is delivered. Also, residents may take white goods to the Fairfax County I-66 Transfer Station, 4618 West Ox Rd., or the I-95 Landfill Complex, 9850 Furnace Rd. in Lorton. There is a \$1 disposal fee for each appliance. The hours of operation are 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Sunday.

Contractor Debris Will Not Be Picked Up

If you employ contractors for home renovations or other services, they must take any waste away with them. The Town's Special Pickup program is meant to aid residents in disposing of bulky materials after performing the work themselves. Contractor-generated waste material will not be picked up.

The Public Works Department will deliver ground leaf mulch and ground wood mulch to town residents free of charge beginning in mid-January. Orders will be taken through February 29. To place your order, call the "Mulch Line" recording, 703-255-6388, and leave your name, address, daytime phone number, type of mulch desired (wood or leaf), and the number of loads to be delivered. One load is estimated to be about the size of a VW Beetle, or 2-2.5 cubic yards. Half loads are available on request.

Please note the following important conditions:

- · All mulch deliveries are based on availability of mulch.
- Mulch deliveries will be placed only in the driveway at the end closest to the house.
- · Once mulch is delivered, it becomes the property of the homeowner, and the Town will not remove any excess mulch ordered.

Residents may pick up mulch themselves in any amount between the hours of 9:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday (except holidays) from January 2 through March 30. The mulch is stored on Town-owned property off Beulah Road near Glyndon Park. Look for the sign, "Free Leaf Mulch & Wood Mulch."





Fluorescent Bulbs – Use and Disposal

The Town of Vienna's recycling program does not currently include fluorescent light bulbs. Individual households do not account for the majority of fluorescent disposal, but more homes are being encouraged to switch to compact fluorescent light (CFL) bulbs. Benefits of CFL bulbs over traditional incandescent lighting include reduced electricity use, which decreases the amount of mercury released into the environment, and cost savings over a longer lifespan.

The Environmental Protection Agency and the Virginia Waste Management Regulations provide guidelines on the disposal of hazardous waste. If generated by a resident (rather than a commercial entity), it is legal to dispose of fluorescent lighting (lamps, bulbs) at the curb with household trash.

Fairfax County hosts a Household Hazardous Waste Program with drop-off sites for residents (see link below). The Town of Vienna is not in this recycling category yet, but does encourage the use of energy efficient bulbs as well as their safe disposal.
